



Michael Toomey to share “Regional Voices of Our National Past” at July meeting



Dr. Michael Toomey, of the East Tennessee Historical Society, will be the featured speaker at the July monthly meeting of the Oak Ridge Heritage and Preservation Association. Dr. Toomey will speak on the subject, “East Tennessee: Regional Voices of Our National Past.” Since 1999, Dr. Toomey has served as Curator of History for The East Tennessee Historical Society as well as Managing Editor of The Journal of East Tennessee History.

In his presentation at the ORHPA meeting, Dr. Toomey will give a brief overview of the East Tennessee Historical Society as well as discuss the “growing power of the federal government in East


Tennessee in the mid-twentieth century with particular emphasis on Oak Ridge.”

Prior to his post at the East Tennessee Historical Society, Dr. Toomey was Dean of Academic Affairs and Associate Professor at Knoxville College as well as a Teaching Associate at the University of Tennessee. He is married to Lydia Birk and they live near Clinton in Anderson County.
